

Special Delinquency Prevention Programs

Special Delinquency Prevention Program (SDPP) is an aid to localities program enacted in 1978 to address the serious concerns for targeted, at risk youth. SDPP provides up to 100% funding for programs to serve youth identified as at-risk who are involved with the juvenile justice system, returning to community from placement, on probation, homeless, chronically truant, school drop-out, pregnant or parenting, victim of violence, involved in prostitution, or self destructive. Programs assist to prevent delinquency and placement through intervention and remediation.

SAFE Alternative and Family Enrichment

NYS Office of Children and Family Services has awarded several New York City Community Based Programs the SAFE Alternatives for Family Enrichment Grant. The SAFE grant allows programs to assist communities to reach out to families who are not yet in the child welfare system, thus providing with the services and supports needed to improve outcomes for children, families and communities.

There are several program model that an agency may operate as, but not limited to, the following program models are:

Program Model #1

- Must operate a minimum of 3 hrs after school
- Must provide a wide variety of services which may include, but not limited to recreation, tutoring, homework help, counseling (individual, group and/or family advocacy);
- Must be able to provide mental health and substance abuse treatment either directly or through a referral network
- Must make referrals to link youth and families to other needed services
- Must provide follow-up and outreach to youth who are enrolled in the program but are not attending on a regular basis.
- Must be a new program or extension program

Program Model #2

- Must serve youth ages 16 - 20;
- Must provide training in employment skills transferable to the current job market;
- Must provide stipends for youth in training;
- Must provide assistance to youth to develop a portfolio, which will professionally present the youth's skills, strengths and talents at the time of a job interview, using the OCFS Portfolio as a guide;
- Must partner with the local employment and training community.
- May provide the National Work Readiness Credentials
- Must be able to provide mental health and substance abuse treatment directly or indirectly.

Program Model #3

- A combination of Program Model 1 and 2, or a program model that utilizes innovative strategies that will accomplish the program's goals.

Runaway & Homeless Youth Programs

New York State designated the Department of Youth and Community Development (DYCD) as the local Youth Bureau, responsible for “Planning, coordinating and supplementing the activities of public, private or religious organizations devoted in whole or part to the well-being and protection of youth”.

In keeping with the federal Runaway and Homeless Youth Act (RHYA) of 1978 and current New York State RHYA regulations, DYCD funds programs that are designed to protect runaway and homeless youth and, whenever possible, reunite them with their families. In cases where reunification is not possible, these programs are designed to help youth progress from crisis and transitional care to independent living. Program activities and experiences are designed to assist youth in becoming healthy, caring, and responsible adults.

Borough Based Drop-In Centers

Program Overview:

Drop-in centers are located in each borough, provide homeless and at-risk youth and their families with information and access to a variety of services including, food provision, counseling, mediation, educational assistance and referrals to local resources such as health and mental health services and substance abuse treatment. In effect, they will be family resource centers, offering support and assistance to youth. There is a licensed Social Worker on staff in all programs.

Program Days/Hours of Operation:

7 Days a Week, From- 9:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m.

Target Population:

Under 21 years of age.

Additional Services:

Drop-in centers raise public awareness about homelessness through workshop presentations in schools and other venues. Drop-in centers also coordinate with all RHY Street Outreach Referral Programs and Crisis Residential Programs.

Borough Based Drop-In Centers

Crisis Shelters

Program Overview:

Emergency shelter is a critical component within the continuum of care for runaway and homeless youth and is the entry-point for residential services in our system. These voluntary, short-term residential programs provide emergency shelter and crisis intervention services with the goal of reuniting youth with their families or, if family reunification is not possible, finding other appropriate transitional and long-term placements for them. Youth will be housed on a short-term basis for up to 30 days, with the possibility to extend for an additional 30 days, pending pre-approval by DYCD. There is a licensed Social Worker on staff in all programs.

Transitional Independent Living (TIL) Programs

Program Overview:

The goal of Transitional Independent Living Programs (TILS) is to provide older homeless youth with the training and skills necessary to establish for them a self-supporting, independent life. If youth cannot be reunited with their families but require a supportive environment in which they can grow and become self-sufficient, the youth may stay in the Transitional Independent Living Program for up to 18 months with a possible length extension with DYCD approval. There is a licensed Social Worker on staff in all programs.

Youth cannot directly contact TIL, entry into a DYCD-funded TIL program comes through a referral from a DYCD crisis shelter only.

Referrals from other approved residential program such as a DJJ or OCFS may be granted, subject to DYCD pre-approval facilities. However priority will be given to youth who are referred through a DYCD-funded crisis shelter. **Addresses of TILS are strictly confidential and should not be shared!**

Street Outreach and Referral Services

Program Overview:

DYCD's Citywide, vehicle-based street outreach services focus efforts on those areas where youth are known to congregate at night. The role of the street outreach worker is to distribute information about RHY services, provide resources, materials and referrals, and transport youth, including subway, from unsafe places to a safe environment—whether that be home to their family, another safe home, or Crisis Shelter.

Program Days/Hours of Operation:

7 Days a Week, From 9:00pm-5:00am

Target Population:

Youth under the age of 21.

Additional Services:

Sensitivity: sensitive, culturally appropriate responses to runaway, homeless and at-risk youth through night-time Street outreach.

Urgent Needs Assessment: crisis intervention and counseling, offering information about resources and, when youth are willing to accept assistance, helping them access the services they need.

Support and Referral Services: information and materials, including food. The contractor would also distribute information about drop-in centers, healthcare services and other network service providers to which youth can self-refer. The contractor would provide materials that encourage safe sex and prevent HIV and STDs.

Transportation: Where youth are in need of and willing to accept transportation, escort them home, to a shelter or other safe environment, or, if appropriate, to a hospital.
